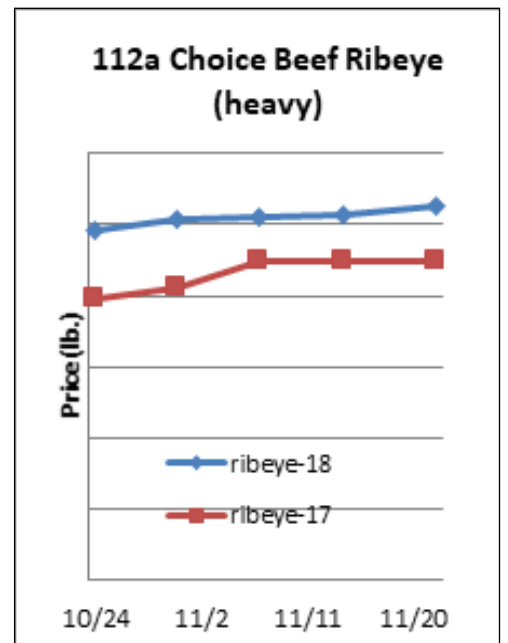
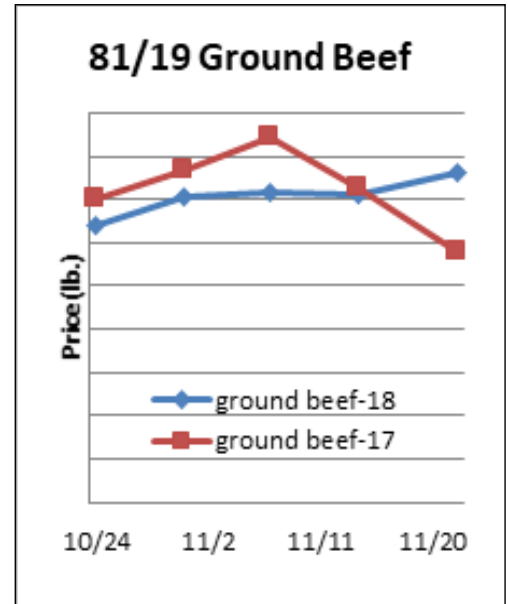

Beef, Veal & Lamb

Despite cattle slaughter coming in 1,000 head over the week prior and even with the same week a year ago, beef production was reduced modestly on lighter carcass weights. Slightly lower beef production is expected to support the cutouts into late November, but as wholesale interest fades on the middle meats (but retail features ramp up), the cutout is expected to ease into December. Spot beef sales continue to struggle, down 13 percent year-over-year across the past four weeks. Additionally, forward-22-and-up beef sales are down eight percent across the past four weeks and may portend larger product available to the spot market, further dragging on the cutouts. 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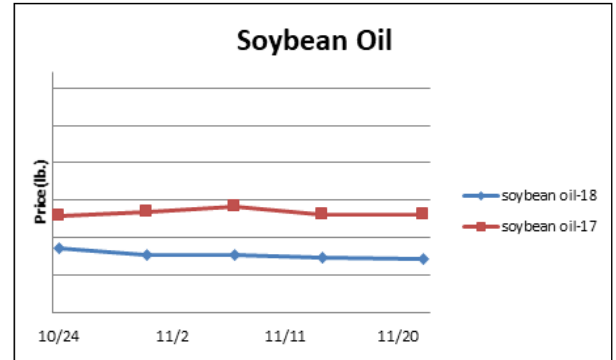
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Grains

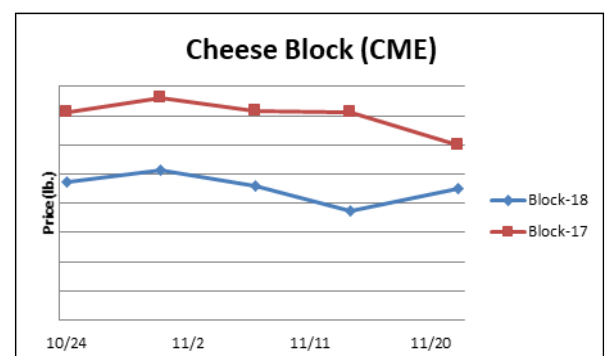

Dairy

The CME cheese markets have continued to trade at historically engaging levels for buyers. The premium in cheese blocks to barrels has narrowed considerably in recent weeks. Low retail prices are playing a part in boosting cheese barrel demand. The average American cheese retail price in October was the lowest for the month in nine years. However, overall American cheese demand could be erratic in the coming months which could cause the discount in cheese barrels to blocks to widen. 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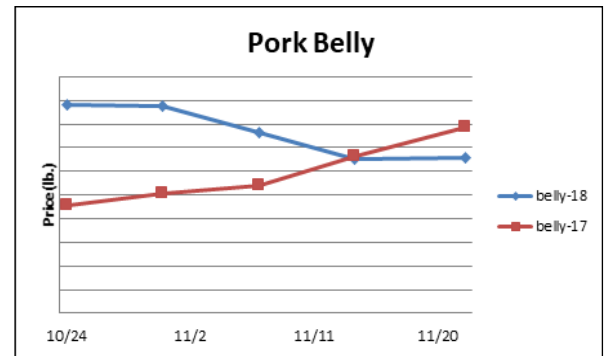
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Pork

Last week, pork production was record large, at 555.2 million pounds, up 5.4% year-over-year, despite carcass weights running two pounds below last year. Strong year-over-year gains in pork output are anticipated this winter, with USDA forecasting Q1 2019 pork production to be up 3.1%. This could limit any seasonal upside in the pork markets. The loin primal, which represents the largest portion of the carcass, is at historic lows, and may have another week to two weeks of weakness, continuing to weigh on the cutouts. 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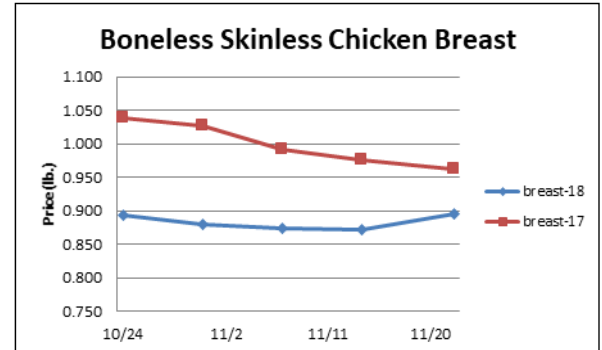
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Poultry

Chicken production for the week ending November 10th was down 0.1% from the prior week but was up 2.3% year over year. As producer margins dwindle, chick placements have eased, leaving expectations for production heading into late 2018 to early 2019 down as much as three percent. Larger production coupled with increasing outputs of competing meats has pressured chicken prices, leaving wholesale prices languishing near multi-year lows. Depressed chicken prices remain attractive opportunities heading into 2019 and, although recent history suggests that prices can still drop through year's end, these low prices should boost demand. 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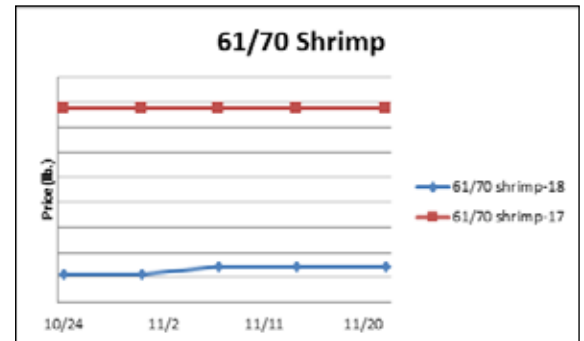
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Seafood

The shrimp markets continue to trade well below year ago levels due in a large part to strong imports. During September, the U.S. imported 5.5% more shrimp than in 2017. Also dampening shrimp prices has been low wholesale and retail competitive protein prices including chicken. This factor is expected to persist which could temper the upside in shrimp for 2019. 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Produce

Market Overview

Eastern and Western Vegetables

The Torreon region is experiencing freezing overnight temperatures which will drastically affect production across the entire category. We anticipate very short supplies on an already tight Roma and Grape tomato market this week. This also will affect bell peppers, cucumber and squash from the region.

The Salinas Valley growing season will be coming to an end. Please refer to the general end dates for Salinas and start dates for Yuma provided. Grapes and eggplant are good buys.

Fall 2018 Transition Schedule

Salinas End: October 26 – November 17
Yuma Start: November 17 – December 3

Over the next few months, please keep in mind that optimal temperatures must be maintained as strictly as possible throughout the supply chain. In the past, we have found that late season leafy green vegetables will not hold up as well as the mid-season leafy greens if temperatures are not properly managed. Please actively take the necessary steps to maximize shelf life as this is very important this time of the year.

Apples & Pears

Apples: There are great supplies of all apple varieties out of Washington, New York, California, Pennsylvania, Michigan. We are also seeing local product available throughout the US with a full range of sizes as well. Quality is at its best.

Pears: New crop Bartlett pears have started with good supply available especially on the larger (70's to 100's) sizes. New crops of Bosc and D'Anjou pears are also now available.

Artichokes

Quality is excellent, and demand is good.

Arugula

Quality is good, but supplies are light as production ends this week. They will improve once we start in the desert next week.

Asparagus

Prices are steady but should increase after next week in preparation for Thanksgiving. Mexico had good volume and quality. Peru is slowing down and volume is light. Quality is good.

Avocados

We are happy to inform you that avocado harvesting resumed in Michoacán early Wednesday morning. Trucks are rolling, and we expect that they will begin crossing the border and clearing customs today or tomorrow. Even with this pick the Avocado markets are really still a possession market. Historically the US usually has around a 2-week supply on hand and at this point supplies are very low. Inventory on all sizes and grades have been affected. Flexibility will continue to be stressed as we work our way back towards the 2-week supply. Inventories are so low that it will take 2-3 weeks to properly fill the Avocado pipeline. The availability of trucks and the Thanksgiving holiday will slow down the ability to move the inventories into position. Fruit that needs to be preconditioned will take longer so please remain flexible.

Bananas

Banana volumes are expected to be sufficient with high quality fruit coming into the market. The conditions should continue to be great as no real issues with production are predicted for the remainder of the year.

Beans

EAST: Despite FL just beginning their bean harvest, there is nowhere near enough supply available to cover demand especially with the upcoming holiday. Normal volumes are expected to resume after Thanksgiving. FOBs are still high and quality in older fields is poor while new crop is yielding fair quality.

WEST: Limited supply from central valley & coastal California are keeping FOBs high, but steady. Quality is fair to good.

Berries:

Blackberries

The market is stable. Mexican stocks continue to increase; the crop will hit its peak in late November/early December. Quality is very good: berries are plump and juicy with sweet, yet slightly tangy flavor. Sugar levels range from 12 to 13 Brix.

Blueberries

Prices are steady. The California season has ended. Mexican and South American supplies are becoming more plentiful. Overall quality is average: berries are deep blue with a slight blush and sweet, yet tangy flavor.

Raspberries

Expect tight supplies for the next few weeks; prices are climbing. Overall quality is very good: sugar levels are moderately high, ranging from 13 to 14 Brix.

Strawberries

Prices will remain elevated for the next three weeks; volume is low. Fall berries are being grown in Santa Maria, California. Quality is average: bleeding and bruising are issues.

Bok Choy

Quality is average, and demand is fair.

Broccoli

The market remains elevated. Hollow core is an industry-wide quality problem that is reducing supplies, especially in Mexico.

Brussels Sprouts

Brussels sprout supplies are plentiful, and quality is great. Use this opportunity to add more Brussels sprout sides to your Thanksgiving menu!

Cantaloupe

WATCH LIST Cantaloupes from Guatemala have started with arrivals into Florida in a very small way. Cooler weather has also affected our own growing regions which is causing some spacing in harvesting. This is causing a demand exceeds supply scenario. Initial arrivals today showed very good quality with sizing mostly in regular cartons (9/12s) with no jumbos being packed during the first few passes. Internal quality is showing solid brix levels in the range of 11-15%.

Carrots

We are seeing both good quality and volume.

Cauliflower

ESCALATED Supplies are light, and pricing has escalated.

Celery

ESCALATED Supplies are very tight this week and are expected to remain light for the month of December. Markets are very good and are climbing. We are transitioning to Oxnard at the end of this week, and Salinas will end either this week or early next week. Quality is still fairly good in Salinas. We expect sizing to be heavier for the larger sizes all week in Salinas. Some celery quality issues exist in the Oxnard region.

Cilantro

Supplies are fair, and quality is improving.

Corn

EXTREME Corn is still very tight across the country.

Cucumbers

EAST: GA numbers are still declining, but still have some decent volume available. Central & S FL have good numbers right now and the off-shore crop is looking to start around December 1. FOBs are steady, and quality is mostly good except on older fields.

WEST: Baja is on the downhill slide, but Sinaloa & Sonora have good numbers coming on board. FOBs are steady, and quality is excellent.

English Cucumbers

Good supplies are now available from Spain and Holland eliminating pro-rates as well as showing decreases in the market. We should continue to see improvements; new crop from Mexico is ramping up daily and quality is very nice.

Eggplant

EAST: GA's crop will be coming to a close soon. Quality from this area is still only fair at best. FL is producing nice numbers with good to excellent quality. FOBs are mostly steady.

WEST: There is no shortage of eggplant from the CA desert. We'll see good supply from this area for roughly another 2 weeks before moving onto Mainland MX. FOBs are steady with great quality available.

Fennel

Supplies for the week will be good and quality is good.

Garlic

The market is about 50% done with the 2017 crop. Supplies are steady, and prices remain high on domestic product.

Ginger

Chinese ginger markets are mixed, but quality is good. Also, product is available at higher costs from Brazil, Costa Rica and Honduras and Peru with no major quality issues being reported.

Grapes

The market is stable; supplies are ample. Green seedless sugar levels range from 17 to 18 Brix, while red seedless and portion-packed sugars vary from 18 to 20 Brix.

Green Cabbage

Supplies are improving and priced are trending downward

Red Cabbage

Supplies are improving, and prices are trending downward.

Green Onions

EXTREME Iced: We are starting to finally see better yields from the Northern Mexico growing areas. Market pricing will begin to ease down a bit. Demand is very good this week because of Thanksgiving pull. Iceless: Similar to iced, yields have increased per acre the past few days. We are expecting to see better volumes in the future. Thanksgiving demand, along with contracts and pre-commitments, will keep the market very active next 10 days.

Honeydew

WATCH LIST Domestic honeydews are facing the same challenges as the cantaloupe, but Mexican dewes are now also being affected which has caused a significant decrease in production in the past five days. We anticipate this market to remain very strong for the next 2-3 weeks with the primary sizing being larger fruit.

Jicama

Markets remain firm due to ongoing short supplies and will continue to see some quality and shelf life issues.

Kale (green)

Quality and supplies are fair.

Kiwi

Good supplies available on Chilean product.

Lemons

The market is showing improvement with new crop out of CA with very few supplies coming out of Mexico.

Lettuce:

Butter

ESCALATED Supplies are very tight, demand exceeds supply, and quality is average.

Green Leaf

ESCALATED Supplies are slightly below normal, and demand is good. Growers are transitioning to the desert this week. Quality has been good with some lighter weights.

Red Leaf

ESCALATED Supplies are very tight, demand exceeds supply, and quality is average.

Iceberg Lettuce

ESCALATED Supplies are slightly below normal, but demand is good. Quality has been good with some lighter weights.

Romaine

ESCALATED Supplies are slightly below normal. Demand is very good, and quality is fair to good.

Romaine Hearts

ESCALATED Supplies are lighter than normal, and demand is very good. Quality is average.

Limes

The market is weak; supplies are abundant, especially 150- to 175-count fruit. Quality is good.

Napa

Supplies are close to normal this week. Demand is steady, and quality is good.

Onions

The Northwest is finished with harvest. From here on out, we will be shipping exclusively out of storage. Quality is strong, and sizing and yields are very good. The onions have full skin and will have good shelf life. We are seeing a surplus of Colossal and Super Colossal in better supply, which has resulted in some reduced pricing on these items. Medium onions are on the tighter side due to the profile being heavy to larger onions. White onions have slightly decreased in price as well with better supplies available. Reds remain very plentiful, and we have seen those markets settle out.

Oranges

Most shippers are in full production with CA navels. Size structure is small, peaking at 138/113/88 with mostly fancy grade, and the market remains low.

Parsley(Curly, Italian)

Quality and supplies are good.

Green Bell Pepper

EAST: Supply is short due to two core reasons: GA winding down and has low yields because of Michael & Plant City has less acreage and low yields. South Florida is not set to start until Mid-Dec.. Expect tight supply until then. FOBs are up significantly & quality is good.

WEST: Supply is short due to transition. CA is mostly done with only one shipper going in a very small way. The desert only has light supply and new crop MX has just scratched the surface. With the recent rains and cold front, supply is not expected to improve for another 2-3 weeks. FOBs are up significantly & quality is mostly good.



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Produce (continued)

Jalapeños (Chiles)

EAST: Supply is still very light from GA with scattered quality. Plant City has begun in a very light way. Better volumes are expected from the area over the next 7-10 days. FOBs are still high, but steady.

WEST: Expect a hot market through November due to recent storms passing through the Chile growing region. FOBs will remain high through this time frame. Quality is fair to good depending on area.

Red and Yellow Bell Pepper

Prices remain high; volume is low on both coasts. California desert supplies remain limited, while production in Western Mexico is at least a week away. Quality ranges from fair to good: scarring is an industry-wide issue.

Pineapple

Expect limited supplies for several weeks; the market is elevated. Heavy rain in Mexico has pushed demand to Costa Rica. Quality is average: sugar levels range from 13 to 16 Brix.

Idaho Potatoes

Demand has continued to be strong through the holidays with limited availability for consumers. There has been Burbank and Norkotah availability, and the Norkotah profile remains on the larger side. While the Norkotah crop has been on the larger side, the Burbank's have been showing smaller sizes. Quality has been excellent, and transportation has been a challenge.

Radishes

Supplies are steady, and quality is good shipping through Arizona and Florida.

Salad Blends

Prices are stable, and volume is average. Incidences of internal burn and mildew in raw product stocks are falling. Inspectors are closely monitoring packs so that RSS products achieve the highest quality.

Snow and Sugar Snap Peas

EXTREME Sugar snap peas will be EXTREMELY tight for the next 3+ weeks, this is going to affect the volumes available for Thanksgiving. Pricing will be higher and will be prorated by 50%.

Snow Peas

WATCH LIST Snows peas are coming in steadily, but there is not a lot of volume is available. Our teams are keeping an eye on this as pricing rises.

Spinach (Bunched)

Quality is good, but supplies are light through transition week.

Spinach (Baby)

Baby and clipped spinach supplies are good, and quality is fair.

Spring Mix

Quality is good, but supplies are light through transition week.

Sweet Potatoes and Yams

WATCH LIST This market has spiked due to heavy damage in the Carolinas. Growers are currently assessing the damage, so it is still too soon to react. However, supplies are still good out of Mississippi.

Yellow Squash/Zucchini

EAST: Zucchini is readily available, however yellow squash is a bit snug. FOBs are steady to slightly up and quality is excellent.

WEST: Zucchini is readily available, however yellow squash is tightening up. FOBs are steady on zucchini, but up a few dollars on yellow. Quality is excellent.

TOMATOES (EAST)

Rounds

Trigger Situation Palmetto/Ruskin continues to push only average or below average numbers. Size options are the biggest concern as last week there was abnormally warm weather and cooler temps are on the horizon. Additionally, majority of demand in the USA is looking at this area to supply volume due to the western region issues, but there is not enough supply to meet expected needs. Thus, we are moving into a trigger situation. FOBs are up significantly across all sizes and quotes are firm. Quality is still good to excellent for what is available. **We recommend expanding size options & accepting sizing exceptions.

Romas

Trigger Situation Romas tend to begin this time of year a few weeks after rounds. We are still anxiously awaiting harvest to ramp up in the east. However, there will not be an abundance of supply as there is less acreage planted. Additionally, the west has very light & limited supply, so more demand is coming east as well. FOBs are up significantly across all sizes and quotes are firm. Quality is good to excellent for what is available. **We recommend expanding size options & accepting sizing exceptions.

Grapes

Trigger Situation Production & supply has been very light the last 2 weeks in the Palmetto & Labelle regions with additional high demand due to MX being short. The improvement we originally expected has been delayed slightly but is still in the forecast for the next ~10 days. FOBs are up significantly, and quotes are firm. Quality is fair to good.

Cherries

Supply has tightened up and FOBs are up. Quality is fair to good.

TOMATOES (WEST/MEXICO)

Rounds

Trigger situation With CA being completely done, demand has turned its focus on MX to supply through the winter months. With the storms a few weeks ago, recent rain, and now a major cold snap, things are not looking good in MX. Supply & sizing is extremely limited and is expected to remain this way for another 4-6 weeks. FOBs are up significantly across all sizes and quotes are firm. Quality is good for what is available. **We recommend expanding size options & accepting sizing exceptions.

Romas

Trigger situation Just as Baja was beginning to ramp up, heavy fog and a cold snap has really stunted the growth cycle. Fruit isn't coloring up as quickly as possible resulting in very limited supply. With the east being short, demand has moved west, leaving hardly anywhere to purchase Romas in the country. FOBs are up significantly across all sizes and quotes are firm. Quality is good for what is available. **We recommend expanding size options & accepting sizing exceptions.

Grapes

Trigger situation High demand, light supply, fair quality is the current disastrous recipe. Cold temps & rain saturated fields are resulting in continuous poor production numbers from Baja. FOBs are up significantly, and quality is only fair at best.

Cherries

Supply is still very snug. FOBs are up. Quality is poor to fair at best.

Watermelons

Prices are steady; supplies are plentiful. Mexico will be the primary growing region for the winter, but Florida crops are also ramping up. Overall quality is good: sugar levels range from 12 to 13 Brix. Offshore melons will become available by the end of the month.
